ITEMS FROM STUDENT REPRESENTATIVES

MS1/MS2/MS3/MS4

MS2 students recommended future scheduling consideration to move ACLS training earlier in the year to avoid overlap with remediation timelines and the CBSE schedule. Specifically, one day of ACLS currently conflicts with the second CBSE. Dr. Francis also asked the students how the new system for reporting objective discrepancies is working. Students agree that the reporting system is effective.

MS4 students requested clarification regarding wristband distribution, specifically whether students not attending Match Day may authorize another individual to pick up their wristbands by emailing Student Affairs in advance. This is particularly relevant because students who are not attending may not be on campus that week

to retrieve them. Dr. Martin confirmed that Student Affairs will send clarification to the class. Additionally, students asked for information regarding graduation ticket limits. Dr. Martin shared that last year students received ten tickets each, with the opportunity to redistribute unused tickets.

MS1 & MS3: No issues reported.

ITEM I Clerkship Phase Review – Team 1

Team 1 presented their review of the M&M block that included the Internal Medicine, Family Medicine, Psychiatry and Neurology Clerkships. The team stated that as a whole, the block goals were clearly outlined and that many components were well done. However, it was noted that one of the listed block objectives referenced demonstrating teaching effectiveness through performance on NBME examinations in Internal Medicine, Psychiatry, and Family Medicine, but did not include Neurology. The team suggested this may have been an oversight or a typo. [Note: The Neurology Clerkship does not require an NBME – this was noted at the CEPC meeting]

The shared topics and associated learning objectives were appropriately documented and were found in Appendix A. However, the team noted that the materials did not clearly describe the combined instructional approaches or the rationale for the integrated threads. The description of shared activities was considered vague, with documentation noting only that combined didactic sessions occur on Wednesdays.

Internal Medicine Clerkship

Katherine Asmis and Kristina Ingles presented their review of the Internal Medicine clerkship. They found that the syllabus was done well, including a clear calendar, objective and assessment mapping to PGOs, assessment descriptions, op-log expectations, and mid-clerkship feedback expectations. Areas for improvement included the absence of listed clerkship director and coordinator contact

information, lack of formal session PGO mapping to geriatrics and palliative care, missing location descriptions, and unclear differentiation between honors, pass, and fail criteria. While overall grade was clear, for individual competency grades, more specifics are needed for different assignments and clinical forms. [Note: Location descriptions and clerkship leadership are posted in Elentra]

The comparability report showed strong performance. All op-log requirements were met without need for alternative assignments, mid-clerkship feedback was timely, and the honors/pass/fail distribution appeared appropriate. NBME scores were at or above the national average overall. A small NBME discrepancy at one site (THOP) and higher Block 2 scores compared to Block 1 were noted but did not appear concerning. Students at William Beaumont reported lack of EMR access, which may impact learning and needs further review. [Note: WBAMC launched a new EMR system in AY 2024-25 which led to student access issues. Students have not rotated at WBAMC in AY 2025-26 and will restart pending resolution.]

Student satisfaction exceeded 90% across all categories, and bedside rounds were consistently identified as a strength. Isolated learning environment concerns included one report of public humiliation and some inconsistencies between resident and attending evaluations. Students also requested decrease of certain written assignments perceived as less relevant and redundant. Noon conference attendance has already been made optional, and additional selective options have been added in response to prior feedback.

Additional outcome measures were strong, with students demonstrating readiness for fourth year and PGY-1 training and high sub-internship performance. One potential area for improvement is evaluation consistency, with reinforcement for the residents throughout the year. Kristina suggested that additional reinforcement on the importance of thoughtful and consistent student assessment would be beneficial.

Overall, the Internal Medicine clerkship was found to be a high-quality experience with strong student satisfaction and outcomes. Recommended action items include

clarifying grading distinctions, updating missing syllabus elements, reviewing clinical site differences and reinforcing evaluation consistency.

Family Medicine Clerkship

Dr. Nemir and Dr. Mayer presented their review of the Family Medicine clerkship. They found that the syllabus demonstrated several exceptional elements, including clearly written objectives, strong integration threads, course and session-level objective mapping, and 100% completion of mid-clerkship reviews. The layout and op-log expectations were considered acceptable. However, several items were missing or unclear, including contact information, a clerkship-specific calendar of events, unclear delineation of clerkship locations, and specific assessment mapping to PGOs. Professionalism expectations were partially addressed but did not include specific language regarding plagiarism or guidance on respectful disagreement. [Note: Plagiarism is covered in the institutional policies] Criteria distinguishing honors from pass were not specifically defined, with expectations for honors described in general rather than explicit terms.

Dr. Nemir stated that the comparability report was overall strong. Duty hours were maintained across sites, mid-clerkship feedback was timely, NBME performance was at or above national averages (with higher scores in later blocks likely reflecting increased clinical experience), clerkship grade distribution appeared appropriate, and final grades were submitted on time. Op-log completion was acceptable. Some alternative experiences were required but this affected fewer than 20% of students and was not felt to represent inadequate clinical volume. Dr. Nemir stated that it was unclear from the data whether students rotate equally across all sites or spend differing amounts of time at specific locations, making site-to-site comparability difficult to fully assess. [Clarification note: all students spend time at Kenworthy and at community sites]

Student satisfaction was high across the clerkship. No areas were deemed unacceptable. A recurring theme in evaluations was concern about limited continuity, with students expressing a desire for more consistent preceptors or opportunities to follow patients over time. Certain sites, including the Sanchez unit

and the Alpine rotation, were rated very highly, with Alpine noted for providing stronger continuity. The Kenworthy experience received mixed reviews, with variability in student engagement depending on resident workload and supervision. It was suggested that identifying strengths at highly rated sites may help with improvements at others.

Additional outcome measures were strong, with graduate performance at or above national benchmarks across competency domains and students appearing well prepared for fourth year. Students reported receiving formative feedback, and the daily feedback expectation was viewed as a strength.

In summary, the review showed that Family Medicine is a strong clerkship that prepares students well and is highly valued by learners. Recommended areas for consideration include clarifying honors with more specific criteria on the clinical assessment forms, addressing missing syllabus elements, continuing to monitor comparability, and continuing to emphasize high-quality formative feedback.

Psychiatry Clerkship

Dr. Sidhu presented the review of the Psychiatry clerkship. The syllabus was found to be well organized, clearly written, and easy to navigate. The clerkship description, calendar of events, and PGO mapping were done well. Multiple clinical locations were listed with site-specific contact information; however, to meet the “exceptional” rubric standard, direct map links needed to be included. Grading criteria for assignments were available in Elentra but not embedded in the syllabus itself. Professionalism expectations were outlined, including general standards such as punctuality and appropriate conduct, though more specific examples of professional behavior and respectful disagreement could strengthen the syllabus. Contact information was not included directly within the syllabus.

The comparability report was described as overall strong. All required op-log encounters were met, and duty hour compliance was maintained across sites. One hundred percent of students received mid-clerkship feedback on time. Final grade submission was slightly delayed in some cases but remained within LCME



requirements. NBME scores were consistently at or slightly above the national average, with only minor block-to-block variation. The Honors rate appeared relatively high, with some years having 50% or more, which may need review to ensure appropriate grade distribution.

Student satisfaction exceeded 90% overall, with particularly strong praise for residents, patient volume, and the variety of clinical exposure, especially in consult liaison and inpatient settings. In response to student feedback about excessive assignments, the clerkship director has already reduced required coursework.

Dr. Sidhu stated that a notable concern involved variability across clinical sites, particularly between EPCC and Rio Vista, in areas such as direct observation and adequacy of patient volume. At Rio Vista specifically, students reported lower rates of direct observation and raised concerns about the intensity of inpatient child psychiatry exposure. She added that one comment referenced a safety incident involving a patient, and another described the rotation as emotionally taxing. While pediatric psychiatry exposure has educational value, Dr. Sidhu stated that the emotional impact and site-specific experience may warrant continued monitoring to ensure student safety and support. [Note that students who rotated at Rio Vista also spend time at the UMC Consult Liaison service and all students are required to log observation of history and physical]. The Clerkship Director noted in her report that the review team that the learning environment issue related to student safety in AY 2024-25 were addressed.

Additional outcome measures were described as positive. Graduates entering psychiatry performed at or above expected competency levels during internship, and students overall reported feeling prepared for fourth year and Step 2.

In summary, Psychiatry was found to be a highly rated clerkship with strong educational outcomes and student satisfaction. Areas for consideration include reviewing the Honors distribution, ensuring consistency across clinical sites (particularly at Rio Vista), clarifying professionalism language in the syllabus, and continuing to monitor student safety and learning environment concerns.

Neurology Clerkship

For the Neurology clerkship, Dr. Parsa found that within the syllabus, the layout, objectives, op-log expectations, and course objective mapping were identified as exceptional. Clerkship description, locations, integration threads, performance objectives, and professionalism expectations were considered acceptable. Contact information was not included directly in the syllabus. Additionally, there was no clerkship-specific event calendar and no specific assessment mapping to PGOs in the syllabus.

The syllabus did not delineate criteria for honors versus pass, making it unclear what students must do to meet minimum expectations versus earn honors in the competency domains. Some language, such as “must master”, lacked specifics regarding how mastery is assessed. Assignment details were also not embedded in the syllabus, though this may have been intentional for readability.

In the comparability report, Dr. Parsa found that Neurology had one of the highest proportions of honors grades among clerkships.

Student evaluations indicated the clerkship is highly rated and at or above average compared to others in terms of learning environment. However, dissatisfaction was higher than average on the item addressing disconnects between professional behaviors taught and those demonstrated by faculty and residents. The clerkship has taken steps to emphasize high-quality formative feedback, including providing training resources and updates to faculty and residents.

In summary, Neurology was found to be a strong and well-regarded clerkship. Areas for consideration include more specific grading criteria for honors versus pass in the syllabus, reviewing the high honors rate and addressing potential concerns regarding professionalism of faculty and residents.

Following the presentation, discussion focused primarily on the review process. Team members acknowledged that the review was thorough but time-intensive,

requiring navigation across multiple documents and folders. It was suggested that future review materials be organized by individual clerkship (e.g., all Neurology documents in one folder) rather than grouped by document type to improve efficiency.

There was also discussion regarding grading. Neurology is graded as Honors/Pass/Fail but does not require an NBME. Dr. Francis provided clarification that final grades are guided by clerkship policy. This is specifically outlined in the Common Clerkship Policies which are reviewed each year. These criteria are not repeated in each syllabus. Dr. Sidhu noted that some clerkships, such as Psychiatry, include competency grading rubrics directly within the syllabus, which may serve as a best practice model for others.

Dr. Khanjani moves the motion for approval.

Appears all OpLog encounters met between varying inpatient and outpatient sites though unable to see data regarding need for alternative assignments.

No violation of duty hours, 100% MCF completed on time, grades in slightly delayed (up to 29 days).

NBME score consistently at or slightly above (1-3% pts) above national average. Subjectively, too many Honors (on average, year-to-year, approximately 50% Honors, 50% Pass).



Psych Clerkship Review: Student Evaluations & Learning Environment

Overall, well over 90% of students satisfied with Psychiatry clerkship! Enjoy the residents, volume, and variety of patient cases seen.

Room for improvement: reduction of number of assignments, which Dr. Ortiz responded has already been done in response to feedback.

Concerning finding: Varying agreement block-to-block and site-to-site (Rio Vista vs EPCC) for direct observation and sufficiency in patient volume.

One report of exposure to sexist remarks & denied training opportunity due to gender.

However, the question "There are disconnects between what I am taught about professional behaviors/attitudes and what is being demonstrated by faculty" is higher than average, this is true for residents as well, but more so for faculty.

Neuro Clerkship Review: Summary

Overall, this appears to be a high quality clerkship, offering tremendous educational value.

Two action areas for consideration:

Inform faculty/residents of the higher than average scores that neurology is receiving for poor professionalism, “There are disconnects between what I am taught about professional behaviors/attitudes and what is being demonstrated”

The clerkship needs to provide criteria to achieve honors and minimum requirements to pass the course and specifics about how the criteria will be assessed. The clerkship has far higher honors rate than any other clerkship.
